


GMQG Quilt Challenge

Make the Blocks: All unfinished blocks should measure: 7½" x 7½" [14½" x 14½"]



Sixteen Patch Block:



Assemble Quilt Center: Press rows in opposite directions. Quilt center should measure 21¹/₂" x 35¹/₂" [42¹/₂" x 70¹/₂"]. (*Diagram 1*)

Add the Borders: Small Quilt Inner Border: Attach side inner borders using the Fabric C1 strips. Attach the top and bottom inner borders using the Fabric C2 strips. (*Diagram 2*). **Outer Border:** Attach side outer borders using the Fabric D1 strips. Attach the top and bottom outer borders using the Fabric D2 strips. (*Diagram 3*).

Large Quilt Inner Border: Piece the Fabric C strips end to end. Subcut into:

2 - 21/2" x 701/2" strips (Side - C1)


2 - 2¹/₂" x 46 ¹/₂" strips (Top and Bottom - C2).

Attach the Side Inner Borders. Attach the Top and Bottom Inner Borders. (Diagram 2).

Large Quilt Outer Border: Piece the Fabric D strips end to end. Subcut into:

- 2 81/2" x 741/2" strips (Side D1)
- 2 81/2" x 621/2" strips (Top and Bottom D2)

Attach the Side Outer Borders. Attach the Top and Bottom Outer Borders. (Diagram 3).



Finishing: Quilt as desired. Attach Trim F1 rick rack to the sides of the quilt using a ¹/₈" seam allowance. Attach Trim F2 rick rack to the top and bottom of the quilt using a ¹/₈" seam allowance. Clip rick rack so the unfinished ends are even with the outside edge of the quilt and be encased inside the binding. Bind as desired with Fabric E strips.

HELD OVER! Guild Logo Challenge

The Guild Logo challenge celebrates the guild's 40thanniversary in 2020. The guild logo was designed by Jeanne Hutchinson in 1984 and made by a group of founding members.

The "rules" for this challenge are simple: make something quilty using the logo inside the name of the guild and show it at the May, 2021 meeting. Enter as many times as you'd like.

You choose:

- the colors and number of colors used
- the size –mini, large or anywhere in between
- the orientation on-point or not
- the embellishment add blocks, strips, borders, poetry, beads, appliqué, whatever you wish
- the item quilt, placemat, beach towel, tote bag, barn quilt... A "flimsy" (non-quilted) top is OK.
- the technique paper piecing, string piecing, appliqué, patchwork, stained glass, photography, paint, etc.

There's a paper pieced pattern for an 8" (finished size) center square called "Vermont 2" at https://www.quilterscache.com/V/Vermont2Block.html. Surround this with Delectable Mountains half-squares. You may use your imagination and make a "variation" of the block, but it should still be vaguely recognizable as the logo block.

Delectable Mountain Variation Border for Vermont 2 Block

Cutting:

Cut [2] 7" squares of green fabric, cut in half on the diagonal - A Cut [12] 2 %" squares of green fabric - B Cut [12]] 2 ³/₄ squares of cream fabric - B Cut [4] 2 1/2" squares of cream fabric - C

Construction:


Attach [1] green triangle A to each side of the Vermont 2 block. Press. Trim to 12 inches (unfinished). Diagram 1

Make [12] HST's from the green and cream **B** squares. Press. Trim to 2½ inches.

Following Diagram 2, join [6] HST units together. Make 4 for borders. Press seams open. Join [1] to each side of 12" block (unfinished).

Add **C** squares to each end of the other [2] borders. Join to top and bottom. Press seams open. Unfinished block is 16 inches.

Have fun! While this will be a true challenge, it may well make you appreciate the work of the original creators. We hope to have an interesting array of items to display at the May GMQG meeting.

The Great Pandemic Sew In

The *Stay Home – Stay Safe* time began in earnest for me right after the Green Mountain Quilt Guild board met on Saturday, March 14. Paul and I had our last dinner in a restaurant that night, and on Sunday, I settled in to do a little quilting as usual. Since then, I have made six quilts, several quilt tops, lots of blocks, and various other things. I started reorganizing and weeding my stash, too. I also finished knitting a scarf I started in winter, 2018, and am now half-way through knitting a challenging (for me) sweater. I worked on my genealogy and even wrote a few family stories down.

I didn't really miss going out much, except to "the place where everybody knows my name," A Quilter's Garden in Montpelier. I was one of their last customers in 2019 and the first one in 2020. During "the pandemic" which is technically still going on, Dee was kind enough to give me curbside service, and now that it's open again with social distancing in place, I am a regular again.

The enforced time at home offered me time to experiment. I cut a lot of tumblers out of Christmas fabric for several table runners and Christmas stockings. I thought I'd use them as "Leaders and Enders" a la Bonnie Hunter, but found I hate doing that! I made a Dresden Plate out of "strings," something I've wanted to do for a while. Like many other sewers, I made face masks, but discovered I am really lousy at making them. My family wears them, but I know they aren't all that comfortable. I toyed around with possible Christmas gifts and settled on one design that I've been chipping away at – I want to have at least 20 on hand when December rolls around.

I started a couple of projects – and actually finished them. My "Corona Cabin" is made of strings, from an overflowing basket. One mystery: why does my basket continue to overflow? Not all my projects were scrappy – a baby quilt made of a fat quarter bundle hanging around, for example – but for most I tried to start with what I had in my stash.

Feeling brave, I entered a couple of pandemic-related virtual art shows organized by the local art gallery. I found it's harder to write an "artist's statement" than to make a quilt. One of my entries was a quilt made of selvages; the other was a Heart of Vermont guild 2020 challenge that I never got to show at a meeting. You can see them at www.studioplacearts.com.



As I write this, I have no tops hanging in the closet waiting to be quilted. I'm quilting one and have another (quilted by Marie Gross) waiting for binding. I'm making monthly progress on a few quilts in project boxes, including a "virtual round robin" I'm doing with an online group. What a feeling! Yet being home has also offered lots of time for browsing online, offering plenty more ideas for the months ahead!

Quilted Hug Shawl

If you're like me, once summer comes it's hard to justify spending days inside quilting. So as soon as a bit of cool weather came, I was ready to start a new, short, project. I happened to come upon an YouTube video for a quilted hug shawl that I could whip up as a birthday gift for my sister. I could just imagine her typing at her computer with this fleece lined shawl keeping her warm but allowing her free arm movement. The project calls for 2½" strips sewn together to make either vertical or horizontal stripes. My problem was I couldn't find fabric that said "this is my sister". But I did have an unusually shaped remnant that was just right. The shawl



has a velcro closure, and includes an inside pocket (think tissues for winter nose drips). The fabric dimensions are: 66½ X 32½, with 6 yards of binding. I refer you to the YouTube video, which is a bit longer than needed, but if you go to the very end she provides a cutting diagram. I think I'll be making more of these this winter, with the help of my cat (yes, it's her tale in the photo). <u>https://youtu.be/Y8_XvvkKjyM</u> --*Sandy Wilmot, August 2020*

QUILTING TIP: Fussy Cutting

To use a special part of the fabric, make a template of template plastic by tracing onto the plastic the actual template including seam allowance with a magic marker. Cut out template with seam allowance. Carefully cut out template plastic from the inside leaving a ¼ inch edge. This can be moved over the fabric until you find the part you want to use. Trace around template with a washout marker or pencil as lines won't show or will wash out when the project is completed. *Sue Schoolcraft*

Green Mountain Quilters Guild Fall Meeting October 12,2019 Old Labor Hall, Barre Vermont Minutes

President Sue Schoolcraft called the meeting to order at 9:40 am. She asked everyone to stand up and (1) introduce themselves to Lucille Leister, one of our founding members, and (2) find someone they did not know and introduce themselves. Officers introduced themselves, and Corresponding Secretary Wendy Richardson said that she would be stepping down after this meeting. Vacant officer positions therefore include Vice President and Corresponding Secretary (vendor coordinator). We had a round of applause for Tess Greaves and her first newsletter.

Robin Mascitti and Marianne Kotch introduced the Guild Logo Challenge for the year which was also detailed in the newsletter. Each had a work in progress to show, and there will be a display of entries at the May meeting. Nola Forbes offered some insight into the creation of the logo in 1984 by Jeanne Hutchinson.

We moved into the program, "Where We Quilters Have Been and Where We're Going," with Lucille Leister, a GMQG founder, discussing the founding of the state guild at a time 40 years ago when there were no local guilds. She showed a quilt she made around that time with the guild logo at its center. It was a gift for her son and was hand quilted. She also showed a hand quilted string quilt, one of her last quilts.

Becky Wigg, a member of the Modern Quilt Guild, then discussed her journey as a quilter, beginning with learning quilting from her mother and grandmother when she was a child. She showed her first quilt and a number of recent quilts and discussed the "modern quilt" movement.

In Sandy Palmer's absence, Nola Forbes discussed the Vermont Quilt Trail and referred people to our website for details (<u>https://greenmountainquiltersguild.wordpress.com/</u>) and a list of locations throughout the state.

Robin Gurney then led show and tell. The last item shown was a quilt top made by Marianne Kotch from a pattern designed by Karen Griska who will be the featured speaker at our May 16, 2020, meeting in Randolph. Details will be included in the spring newsletter. Sue then asked if vendor Susan Parker of Hen House Fabrics would like to share what she had brought. Susan showed a few items and also said that she hopes to retire and sell her shop by next June.

After lunch, the business meeting resumed at 12:30 pm. Bronwen Neale moved that the Secretary's Report as included in the last newsletter be approved. Charlotte Croft seconded, and the motion passed. Treasurer Robin Mascitti presented the Treasurer's Report, copies of which were available at each table. Marianne Kotch moved that the report be approved, Soni Johnson seconded, and the motion passed. Robin had included a budget for 2019-2020 in the report but we discussed that further. Chris Maute suggested increasing the line item for the newsletter to \$120, given the cost of the fall one. She then moved approval of the revised budget, Jane Buskey seconded, and the motion was passed.

Winners of various raffles were drawn. Robin Mascitti won the maple leaf block raffle, while Chris Maute won the door prize from Hen House Fabrics. Janet Ressler won the raffle basket which was actually a shopping bag made by Sue Schoolcraft and stuffed with goodies.

Mask making gave me a purpose, kept me focused on the mask at hand and not dwelling as much on all the bad pandemic news.

The quilter in me has been using beautiful fabrics and the former production stitcher in me keeps striving to make more each day. Both of these skills have come in handy at this moment. I've made and donated a lot of masks...for family and friends, local hospitals and my community neighbor to neighbor project. I was also asked to help make masks for Cabot Creamery employees. Payment from them and a few donations have funded this effort. To date, my face mask total has surpassed 1,800 since the end of March.

I have done a little quilting as well. I've finished a Halloween wall hanging/table topper. It's a smaller version of a lap quilt I designed earlier this year before the pandemic. I planned to write the pattern for both of them this year but got side tracked. Look for them next year!

I'm most excited about my little hexie garden wall hanging. I started this years ago along with many other hexagon projects, none of which I have finished! My Calico County Quilt Guild can attest to seeing me drag this little thing around to several meetings for my hand project. This summer I needed a hand sewing project to keep me busy while parked on the porch. I dragged it out again.

It's my own design using English paper piecing with half-inch cardstock hexagons. It will measure about 18 x 21 inches when done. I'm adding one more outside border and then need to figure out how to finish it. I'm committed to finally completing a hexagon project and this is the year to do so. Something good from 2020!
